We were unfortunate, however, in losing one of our classmates, Pauline Engle.


Our class has enjoyed the activities and privileges of the school and have the intention of coming back next year.

There is no reason why we should seek an excuse for this fact because the cause cannot wholly be explained. It is well known that no team in the conference possessed more willing and harder workers than this team.


Both teams regret very much that Coach Pitts was unable to be with them the entire season.


