

We keep Em Flying

CCUPYING an area of over thirteen hundred acres and representing an investment in excess of twelve million dollars, The Naval Air Technical Training Center near Norman, Oklahoma was commissioned September 20, 1942. The center was built in record time—four and a half months—thereby earning for the contractors the Army-Navy "E" Award. According to figures released from Washington, the full complement of the Training Center will be over sixteen thousand. This figure includes enlisted men and marines as well as a thousand WAVES.

The Training Center may be said to be composed of three separate schools under one command. In the school for Aviation Machinist's Mates men learn to repair all makes and types of aircraft engines used by our Naval forces. The Metalsmith School instructs men to repair, rebuild, or replace damaged metal parts. The Ordnancemen's School trains men to repair and maintain aircraft armament of all kinds, large and small. Housed in separate areas by schools, each area has completely equipped dispensaries, adequate mess halls, recreation buildings, ship's service facilities and regular classroom buildings.

In its training program the Navy spares nothing. The latest type planes are placed at the disposal of the men so that each may know exactly what he will have to do when he goes into the combat zones. The Navy operates on the theory that men trained on obsolete equipment can not be expected to become proficient in repairing the new types of planes which return from battle with motors damaged and wings torn by bullets.

This Navy activity is a modern and self contained city. As such it must provide the hundreds of necessary facilities for efficient operation. Barber shops, shoe repair and laundry collection services are functions of the Ships Service Stores and the four stores are well stocked with all the necessities and

many of the luxuries appealing to the sailor. Here he may enjoy a refreshing drink from the soda fountain or purchase a gift for the girl back home.

The four Recreation Buildings are completely equipped with facilities for a variety of sports. The range is from table games to badminton and basketball. Modern swimming pools are adjacent to each of these buildings. Late motion pictures free to enlisted personnel are shown several times daily.

The Naval Training Center is equipped with a modern and up to date laundry covering an area of almost one city block. Over 100 people work in full eight hour shifts. A spotless bakery with a daily capacity of 22 thousand loaves of bread keeps the men well supplied with the staff of life. Huge warehouses where as much as 150 tons of vegetables are stored at one time give ample evidence that the Navy feeds well.

The Station Auditorium, one of the largest structures of its kind in the state, will seat over six thousand bluejackets. It is used so that the men may enjoy the large traveling shows as well as actively participate in intermural and other physical activities.

The State of Oklahoma is the focal point of a number of naval activities. In the immediate area of Norman there are three additional commands, the Naval Air Station, the U. S. Naval Hospital and the U. S. Naval Air Gunnery School.

Our men in the air, on the ground and on the sea often work under conditions that offer no opportunity for another chance if equipment fails in an emergency. It must be right—always right! To train the finest technicians possible is the purpose of the Naval Air Technical Training Center.




No special occasion is overlooked by the chefs in preparing the tastiest of meals for the special occasions. This Christmas menu was something to write home about.

Cooking meat by the tons, potatoes by the carload and baking bread by the thousands of loaves is no small task, but who can work and study on an empty stomach?









The WAVES at N.A.T.T.C. have one of the most exclusive beauty shops in the world and business is booming in off hours just before liberty.





★ Captain's inspection Saturday





* All hands abandon ship



Most of the sailors have found the campus of the University of Oklahoma a suitable one for extra-curricular activities . . . and especially is this so of the famous OVAL.




* Norman's great white way

This is a metropolis, Oklahoma City and just 18 miles from the station.




Horses, like sailors, stand their regular watches. Attached to the guard unit, they are used daily in patrolling the fences.
