YOUR HEALTH

ULCERS

AN ULCER is simply a sore upon the skin or mucous membrane, in other words, a breaking down of the cells, frequently with only slight tendency to get well.

In the latter respect ulcers differ from healthy wounds which begin to get well almost as soon as they are formed or made.

There may be caused by injury, by burns, and by poor nutrition of the tissues where they occur.

They may be accompanied with sloughing or destruction of the tissue, and perhaps by resorption of dead and poisonous material.

They are often attended with hemorrhage and with great weakness in consequence of the prolonged discharge with some from them, and which involve waste of tissue without power strength for repair.

This is particularly the case with this spring.

Ulcers which attend such diseases as syphilis and tuberculosis. Ulcers which accompany these diseases are often formidable unless means are taken to cure the disease which caused them. The first will include all necessary hygienic measures, comfortable and well ventilated housing, sleep, exercise in the open air, good food, including an abundance of milk, and perhaps such tonic as cod liver oil, quinine, strychnine and iron.

Local treatment includes cleanliness and frequent dressing of the ulcer, and the application of astringent and astringent solutions, especially one's materials as lead, copper, zinc, mercury and silver.

In ulcers of the stomach, a strict diet is almost imperative—that is, the stomach must be given just as little work as possible.

Some of the symptoms of ulcer of the stomach are sharp pain, indigestion, loss of appetite and hemorrhage. If the ulcer perforates the posterior wall of the stomach, there may be serious hemorrhage and even fatal perforation.
