The dairymen in the vicinity of Orchard Farm, who have been doing an extensive business for many months, held a meeting last Wednesday night at which time they organized a Shippers' Association by electing Fred Weibink president and William Spahn secretary and treasurer of the new organization. The new organization is considering the proposition of erecting a modern station at Orchard Farm which will be equipped for handling their milk, cooling, etc., ready for shipping. Herman Hartlage has been building some sidewalks in the town of Cottleville and has just completed his contract for one thousand feet of walks. Through the generosity of the late George Miller who died there several years ago these sidewalks came free. Mr. Miller was a man who loved Cottleville and he showed it in a substantial way, by setting aside a certain sum of money as a fund for the improvement of his home town. The interest earned by the funds is to be spent for permanent improvements in Cottleville.

Warrenton.

Aluminum articles may open a branch factory at Fredricksburg. A state Game and Fish Department has ordered 300 head of southern wild turkey to be delivered this month. Clyde Weaver, 30 years old, pastor of Andria county, died Monday night at the Andria hospital in Mexico. Death followed an operation for appendicitis. Twelve more Bellviewland airplanes have been purchased by the Robertson Aircraft Corporation for use in air mail service between St. Louis and Chicago. A pickle forty years old is in the possession of a citizen at Lemona, Mo. It was sealed in a bottle of vinegar in 1886 and has remained there since. Scarlet fever is raging in Columbia, Mo. Quarantine has been placed on seventeen houses in that city where scarlet fever has been found. One case of diphtheria is also under the ban. A movement has been launched to establish a national park on the Wilson Creek battlefield near Springfield. One of the most important battles of the Civil War was fought at Wilson Creek. The bridge over Big Cedar Creek on Highway No. 46 at the boundary line between Boone and Callaway counties has been completed. It is 231 feet in length, the longest in Boone county. Five thousand hogs in the vicinity of Keyaville are infected with cholera, according to farmers, who report that the epidemic is spreading to the north and southwest. The serum famine is said to be acute. Heavy rains throughout northern and central Missouri have caused more than \$200,000 damage to roads in the state highway system through slides, undermining of earth fills, washing of surfaces, and the washing out of small bridges and culverts. Albert Ham, 51, of Hannibal, drove his automobile head-on into the Mississippi river from one of the principal streets in Hannibal recently. The car was pulled from the river two hours later with the body in it. The youth's family could give no reason for suicide, and it is suggested that he became confused in directions and turned the wrong way. A postal card Mrs. James McCarty wrote to her mother fifteen years ago was delivered within the past month. In 1909 Mrs. McCarty was living in Sireator, Ill. On August 10 of that year, according to the date on the postal card and also the post mark, Mrs. McCarty wrote the card to Mrs. W. H. Huskey of Bolla. She never heard from the postal until about three weeks ago, when her brother-in-law J. W. McCowan, who drives the Hobson Star Route mail car, brought the card to her and stated that W. H. Huskey had received it about a week before. The postal bears the postmark "St. Louis, Mo., September 16, 1909." Mrs. Huskey died about two years ago.
