\$7500 Award For Death Of Jonesburg, Mo. School Girl

A verdict awarding a judgment of \$7500 against Harvey Easley, 50, of Macos, Mo., and exonerating Elmer Brown, 45, of Clay-ton, Ind. for the death of Evelyn Bolton, 12-year-old school girl in an auto accident near Jonesburg last fall, was returned by a jury at Troy Tuesday, Judge E. Woolfolk presided.

Mr. and Mrs. Bolton, parents of the victim, sued Easley and Brown, drivers of the two cars involved in the accident, for \$20,000.

The two men are also being sued for \$20,000 by Mr. and Mrs. William Kribben, of Jonesburg, parents of Agnes Kribben, 14, who was fatally hurt in the same accident.

The two girls were killed Oct. 8 near a schoolhouse on U. S. Highway 40, two miles of Jonesburg. The two girls, walking side by side along the edge of the pavement, were going to a mail box a quarter of a mile west of the Ball School to post a letter when they met two eastbound cars, one trailing close behind the other. Brown drove the first machine, and Easley the second. Upon approaching the girls Easley attempted to pass Brown, according to testimony given, as a third machine appeared over the crest of a hill several hundred yards ahead. As the gap between Brown's car and the third machine closed rapidly, Easley was forced to cut back sharply to the right side of the pavement to avoid a head-on collision. In swerving, however, the rear of his car sideswiped the front of the Brown machine, and crowded the latter off the concrete and onto the girls. After striking the pair, the auto, with its three passengers rolled over
