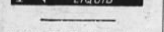

Dairy Conference At O'Fallon
Arrangements have been completed for the second annual conference to be held at O'Fallon Thursday, March 9, from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. A luncheon will be served by the women of the O'Fallon Catholic church and the program for the day will be one full of encouragement and information for the visiting dairymen.

The program will center about the possibility of lowering the cost of production and the development of more adequate pasture systems.
