Even Late Planting Of Oats Profitable Says County Agent

The late seeding of oats for grain or hay will be profitable in Warren county even the weather conditions have prevented early planting, says Emergency County Agent Brown.

By observing good practices satisfactory yields of oats can be obtained from seedings at late as April 12 to 25. If June weather is normal, high yields are possible.

When seeding oats after the period of April 10 to 15 the use of the Columbia variety is very important. It is the early maturing, short-strawed variety that is less adversely affected by late seeding.

One and one-half bushels per acre should be the maximum rate of seeding. Heavier rates of seeding will not increase yields and possibly will result in lowered quality.

National Campaign For Safety On Highways

A national campaign, declaring war against the use of unsafe tires will shortly be launched by the B. F. Goodrich company, according to G. H. Mittler, Goodrich tire dealer, following a meeting in St. Louis where the safety program was outlined.

"Goodrich, a pioneer in promotion of greater safety on our streets and highways for more than 30 years, will enlist its entire organization in the war on dangerous tires. National Safety Council figures show that more than 37,000 deaths were caused by motor vehicle accidents last year; while 1,200,000 injuries followed automobile accidents.

"In the past 15 years, 500,000 Americans lost their lives in traffic accidents and many of these were traceable to tire failures, principally blowouts.

"Goodrich began its work in highroad safety when automobiles first came into use erecting signs on dangerous curves, at intersections and schools throughout the United States. In 1912 a safety tread for automobiles was introduced to give road traction and prevent skidding.

The movement to make American car owners tire conscious

and remove hazardous tires from service will be carried during the year 1937," Mr. Mittler has been a Goodrich dealer since 1932.
