State Planning Board Urges Merging Of All Tax Units

The State Planning Board for Missouri recently completed a study of rural government in the State and urge the consolidation of the "thousands" of independent taxing and administrative units handling Missouri's rural schools and roads. County consolidation is described as "not practical or necessary" and "having almost unmountable obstacles" in its path. In the survey it is recommended that administration of roads and schools be made on a county basis, with the statement that "as long as three-fourth of the costs of rural government goes for schools and roads which are operated by thousands of independent taxing units. The survey says that Missouri is governed locally by 11,625 independent taxing units of which 10,517 are directly concerned with "rural" affairs. There are 9211 school governments, 847 special road districts, 345 organized townships, 114 counties and the City of St. Louis. "Increased costs, which are with us to stay, demand that the government shall be performed in an efficient and businesslike manner," the survey says. "The organization and geographical distribution of rural governmental authority is a survival of the nineteenth century, when conditions were vastly different."

LOVE and a DOLLAR

DING-A-LING-AL-I-I-I-NI! Hello! Oh, hello, dear! Don't tell me you're not coming home to dinner! Oh, you are coming—well, that's just grand. You're here!—I don't hear you—'whom are you bringing?' Oh—Andy and Mary—that's fine. Be here at six, won't you? Goodbye, dear! And then she looks in her purse in the dresser drawer and finds—one dollar! One dollar for breakfast! Well, you can't let a good husband down. After all, a dollar goes a long way—if you know how to stretch it. People have learned that in the last few years. Good Morning Greer! So off to market. Can't trust to the telephone. Andy loves asparagus, but suppose it isn't fresh picked. Anyway fresh asparagus is expensive if it's good. Canned asparagus is always good — you can't beat that. But then that nice pineapple and cabbage salad calls for fresh tender cabbage. Better go and select it. The writ' wa'rs says eleven o'clock. Ample time to get the canned raspberries and make that pretty raspberry ice cream that Mary likes. This that perfect wife we read about sums up the situation. There's not more than low-and-a-dime. She's got love and a dollar—and here's what to do with it and how she prepared the perfect dinner: Hamberger and Appurage • Toast 36¢ • Potato Cake 7¢ Tomato Fritters 13¢ Cabbage and Pineapple Salad 12¢ Rolls and Butter 8¢ Raspberry Ice Cream 19¢ Tax 4¢ Hamberger and Appurage: Combine one cup ready shredded hamburger steak in two tablespoons butter and one and slightly brown. Stir with a fork to keep the pieces separate. Melt one tablespoon butter in a pan, add one tablespoon flour and stir until smooth. Add one-half cup water and the contents of a can sausage soup, stirring until creamy and thick. Add the meat and pour over the toast. Tomato Fritters: Beat one egg slightly, add two cups canned tomatoes, and one and one-half cups crushed cracker crumbs, and season with salt and pepper to taste. Let stand for ten minutes. Drop from a spoon into plenty of hot fat in a skillet. Brown on one side, turn and brown on the other side. Drain on brown paper. This makes about twelve small fritters. Cabbage and Pineapple Salad: Combine one cup ready shredded cabbage and one-half cup crushed pineapple, mix with four tablespoons mayonnaise and serve on crisp lettuce leaves. Raspberry Ice Cream: Scald together the contents of one Scovone can evaporated milk, one-third cup sugar and three tablespoons water. Cool. Add two tablespoons lemon juice and one cup canned raspberries which have been washed and pressed through a sieve. Freeze.

FOR SUMMER THIRST



DRINK GRAPES. (Save the fruit for a delicious summer salad.) Mix all ingredients together and, just before serving, add two bottles of charged water and plenty of crushed ice. This fills sixteen punch glasses. (Seasonal Special: Mix together one 16-ounce can of grapefruit juice, one cup of syrup from canned pineapple, add one-fourth cup of sugar and one cup of water, and add the juice from one No. 2 can of pitted sour cherries, one-half bottle of charged water, and serve very cold in punch glasses. This fills ten punch glasses. Cherry Slushy: Roll one-fourth cup sugar and one cup water, cool and add the juice from one No. 2 can of pitted sour cherries, one-fourth cup of maraschino cherry juice and the contents of a 16-ounce can of grapefruit juice. Chill and add the contents of a bottle of charged water, put in fresh mint and very cold. This fills twenty punch glasses. Frenchie and Celery Cocktail: Summer hostess for thirty minutes three cups of strained tomato juice, two cups of water, one cup of celery (using the outer stalks only), one teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon horseradish, one tablespoon onion, one teaspoon of onion juice, one teaspoon of onion oil, one teaspoon of onion salt. Strain and serve very cold in cocktail glasses. Serve eight glasses.
