Fred Petzold Funeral Feb. 13

The funeral of Henry Petzold of St. Louis was held at Warren February 13. He was 75 years old and was a former resident of Warren County.

Mr. Petzold was born June 10, 1863 in Lisa, Province Posen, Germany. He came to America in 1899 and lived in Nebraska and later moved to Warren county where he remained until 1908 when he emigrated to the Canadian Northwest, which was then being opened for settlement.

He settled there on virgin soil and cleared a farm ninety miles from a railroad. In 1912 he returned to Warren county. Surviving him are three sons: Ernest of India, California, Charles of Cuba, Mo. and Fred of Marthasville; and a daughter Mrs Marie Roper of St. Louis.

Examination For Teachers

The first of the three regular annual examinations for teachers will be held at the College in Warren on Friday and Saturday, March 4 and 5, 1938. The subjects will be given in the following order:

First day—forenoon: Geography, Language and Orthography. Afternoon: Grammar, Arithmetic and Reading. Second day—forenoon: Civil Government, U. S. History, Agriculture, Algebra and Advanced Science. Afternoon: Physiology, Writing, Pedagogy, Literature and Advanced History.

Subjects will not be given at any other time than during the half day as indicated above.

Applicants who desire to write in this examination for another county should procure a receipt and number from their county superintendent before the date of the examination.

No visitors are allowed. The examinations begin at 8 a. m. on both days.—F. W. Kehr.

Pickets Leave Post To Attend Funeral Of Member Killed

The St. Charles Cosmos-Monitor says: All but a handful of union men left the picket lines on the St. Charles county side of the river this morning (Wednesday) to attend the funeral of Joseph Feltes, 39, who lost his life in the labor row.

About 150 union brother members of Mr. Feltes gathered at the Immaculate Conception church awaiting the funeral procession, and after attending the services went to the cemetery grounds where the body was laid to rest.

The union men made no demonstration, attending only as personal friends, and quietly returned to the picket lines after the funeral ceremony. The half dozen pickets who stayed on duty during the funeral reported no disturbance during that time.

Feltes is survived by his wife and seven children. He died Monday night from injuries sustained a week prior when he was run over by vehicles of workmen who drove through the picket line.

Union officials stated they had made efforts to obtain a warrant from Prosecuting Attorney Joe Wentker for the truck driver who headed the procession of workers, but were refused. It is alleged that Wentker told Union members that the present trouble must be settled first and that he would then consider Feltes case. He has made no comment since the death.
