Government Now Has About 78,000 Homes On Its Hands

Uncle Sam now has on his hands about 78,000 homes, taken over from private owners who proved to be poor risks. The most of these homes belong to the Home Owners Loan Corporation, set up in 1933, as a stopgap in a bad credit situation when foreclosures on private homes reached a peak of 1,000 a day.

At this time the HOLC owns approximately 77,229 homes, which are worth an average of \$6,900 each. Already 80,824 other properties have been sold, the Corporation taking a book loss of about 778,834,000.

On the other hand, the Federal Housing Administration with more conservative credit policy has meanwhile had to foreclose on only 1,188 small home properties and three large housing projects out of approximately 465,730 mortgages it has underwritten to date.

About half of the FHA homes that were foreclosed were sold with an average loss on each of between \$400 and \$600.
