to make or chromium plating. Electrolytic plate has been used in the past chiefly for dry packing. Experiments are being going on to find if there are any foods which cannot be safely packed by this method. If any such foods are found, they will probably be put in glass containers.

**Tea of Black Tea . . .**  
Mrs. America has a decided preference for green tea, and had better start cultivating a taste for black tea. The green varieties have been most in the hands of importers, packers and wholesalers except for that already packaged in fourth pound or smaller quantities. Green tea normally makes up only about one-third of the United States tea imports. Most of it comes from China or Japan which are, of course, cut off by the war.

**Travels to Sports Events . . .**  
Mrs. America and the family are being asked to give up traveling to football games or sports events. During the fall and winter months in game-time hundreds of Americans travel by train, bus, and automobile to college and professional games. But this year passenger train and motor bus equipment must be conserved for the movement of troops, of soldiers and sailors on leave, and relatives and others going to and from camps, as well as for the movement of those who must travel on essential business connected with the war.

**"Upgrading" of Meats . . .**  
The OPA has ordered stricter grading requirements of both beef and veal by packers. Mrs. America may have noticed that a larger percentage of the meat she sees displayed in her meat market is graded "choice." Normally, only about five percent of the total beef and veal output receives this highest grading. The recent increase in the proportion of "AA" meat actually represents "upgrading" and it means a "hidden" price increase. OPA regulations will eliminate these increases.
