June 12 is D-Day On Warren County's Homefront

C. S. Ruge, Warren County chairman for the War Finance Committee stated that Monday, June 12 is D-Day on the "Homefront." Unlike our military chiefs who keep the D-Day for the invasion of Hitler dominated Europe a closely guarded secret, we here in America are more than willing and anxious to announce to the whole world that starting June 12 Americans everywhere will again be lending their money to their government to help raise the largest amount ever asked by any government at any time.

Chairman Ruge said "Our government is asking the citizens of Warren County to lend \$232,000 through their purchases of War Bonds and other government securities during June 12 and continuing until July 8.

While the amount Warren County has been asked to raise may seem small in comparison to the national quota of 16 billion dollars, it is very important that Warren County raise its share. Coming at a time when invasion of Hitler's Europe is on the lips of every person all over the world, the Fifth War Loan Drive means more than all of the previous War Loans drives because the money invested in War Bonds now assures an ample supply of vital War materials which are so necessary to the success of this invasion. An ample supply of fighting equipment also assures the saving of many American lives.

We must not be too late with too little. At this very moment millions of Americans are engaged in the big push-the drive which will not survive, but there is not a single man who is not willing to make the supreme sacrifice in order to keep America free. With men standing ready to give up their lives, surely there is no American here at home who is not more than willing to open his purse and lend his or her money to help back the attack.
