In Missouri's Legislative Halls

After a lengthy and full debate the house has set January 15 as the date for date for starting of pre-assessment. Under this plan the taxpayer will know little or nothing of the change. His taxes will become due and payable the last two months of the year, instead of the usual difference which is that he will know his property value as of January 1 until July 1st.

The change in assessment was mandatory under the new Constitution. Previously, under the old Constitution, property assessment was made in one year and the taxes were due and payable the following year. But the new state constitution provided for an assessment and tax collection to be made in the same year. The only thing that the House had to do was whether the assessment should be made in January or in July whether the state should be placed on a calendar basis or on a fiscal year basis, with the year starting July 1st.

The assessors of the state lobbied strongly for the July 1st date for starting assessment with the taxes payable the following May. One of their principal arguments was the bad weather in January and the fact that they were forced to make out their federal income tax statements.

Then, too, it is generally true that farmers are in a better position to pay taxes in the fall of the year than in the spring. The spring farmers are pulling their other things to prepare for their seeding and reaping. They have to put their crops in. Many purchase under bags and cattle for their pastures. In the fall they have had their crop ready to sell they can get under OPA regulations in a better position to pay their tax bills.

The House also studied the tax payment question, carefully from another angle. If the assessors had not voted, taxpayers would have had to pay taxes this fall, and next fall they would have had to pay taxes to pay two full years' taxes in Missouri. The bill passed, if assessed as of July 1st, would be more than that of June 1st.

The state representative felt that this would be too much of a burden on taxpayers--even to accommodate the county assessors and make the assessors' work easier. With the changing of the date of assessment, the taxpayers will not be inconvenienced at all.

Fishing And Squirrel Season Opens May 30

Jefferson City—Missouri hunters and fishermen are looking forward to May 30, opening day of the season on squirrels, black bass, rock bass, warmouth bass, jack salmon, crappie and bullfrogs.

For many sportsmen the Memorial day holiday will afford the first opportunity of the year for an outdoor and due to regulation changes by the Conservation Commission, they may for the first time utilize one trip to open the season on both squirrels and all major species of game fish.

Fishermen, however, are keeping their fingers crossed as they watch the daily weather forecasts. After one of the wettest seasons on record, a week or more without rain is needed to permit streams to fall to normal and clear up. Even with one normal week, many of the larger streams and lakes probably will be murky and in poor condition by next Wednesday.

Squirrel hunters, not so dependent on the weather, are anxiously awaiting a chance to relieve the most abundant species of squirrel. An abundant breeding stock of squirrels is one of the largest state, although Melvin O. Stout, in charge of the Conservation Commission, said game officials, has estimated this season's crop at only as large as a crop as in 1944.

Last year's bumper crop of the squirrels ran the season into a shortage of nuts and acorns last winter. As a result, Stout explained, undisciplined breeding females may not produce the normal amount in 1945. The natural food shortage led to different parts of the state, however, so the 1945 crop may be spotty--abundant in some localities and scarce in others.

The squirrel season was extended 20 days for this year, opening two days earlier and closing November 20--one month later than last year, with rain days closed just before sunrise--walk squirrels daily 9 and 9, and 10 and 10, and 11 and 11. The open season on black bass, rock and warmouth bass starts 30 days earlier this year, as opening on the first of September, instead of June 15. May 30 also marks the opening of black bass and jack salmon fishing in the Lake of the Charles and waters regulated by section 55-a of the wildlife code.

"Channel cat fishing open since March 15, will be closed beginning June 1 until July 1." Closed period on channel cats does not apply on waters regulated by section 55-a.

Progs may be taken only from 2 in the afternoon until midnight, daily bag limit is 10, possession 25. Game fish limits remain unchanged from last year.
